
CALLING ALL CHILDREN - YOUR HELP IS NEEDED

EASTER EGG RAFFLE

A few villagers were chatting one night in the pub about the forthcoming visit of the Easter Bunnies, when Kenton suggested that he would run a raffle and the proceeds could go to a local charity.

Below is a short article about the charity itself and some photographs. The tickets, priced at £1 each, will be on sale at the pub, so please come along and show your support. If the pub is somewhere you don't go to, there are plenty of villagers who would be very happy to buy some on your behalf. Thanks.

In 1970 Joan and Bill Puddy set up Wylve Valley Disabled Children's Riding Charity which has been financing horse riding holidays for physically disabled children between the ages of 11 and 16 ever since.

Every summer, up to 20 children, along with a dedicated team of volunteer helpers, spend a week under canvas in Heytesbury Park near Warminster. The camp is a completely self-contained community that brings together horses and people to create a unique environment combining learning, therapy and fun ... really.... it's lots and lots of fun for everyone involved.

Daily activities at the camp include riding, swimming, trips to local attractions and days out. For this to be possible each disabled child has a team of 3 to 4 amazing voluntary helpers, who give freely of their time each year, several in fact for the last 45 years! This makes for a camp of between 80 - 100 people and it's not cheap to put on a week of this kind - inevitably the camp expenditure is huge.

Not only do they need to cover food and consumable catering items for 90 mouths 3 times a day but also marquees for the holiday children's sleeping accommodation, activities, day trips, resources, coach hire and insurance. Phew! So as you can imagine any help they receive be it large or small is very gratefully received.



The photographs of last year's camp say far more than I can about the fantastic time the children have, as do their brilliant helpers.

The Chairman of the Parish Council and General Sir Nick Parker, met with our MP and a representative of Wiltshire Roads Department to highlight the problems of speeding and overweight vehicles.

The outcome was total negativity, largely due to lack of priority and funding. The main conclusion emanating from the meeting is that we have to keep pressing for action. This can be done by continuing with Speed Watch and getting involved with the new Lorry Watch. Measurement of our concerns can be measured using our Speed Watch programme. But it needs people to man the camera. If you give only a one hour of your time during the three week periods we have the camera, this would be helpful, although more would be better.


