ARMY ACTIVITIES

TRAINING

After the quiet month of April, May starts with the final two weeks of EXERCISE WESSEX STORM. This is a very light Brigade with few armoured vehicles. The remainder of the month sees 6 armoured Company/squadron deploying to both east and west of Salisbury plain at varying times. There are the usual courses deploying from both Warminster and Larkhill, where both Lt Gun and AS90 will be firing. May is busy so consequently all tank crossing sites on both the A360 and the A345 will be busy.

Please report all concerns to the Complaints Help Desk on 01980 670819 in the first instance.


BYELAW GOVERNANCE - ANTISOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

Parish members are encouraged to report all illegal activity on Salisbury Plain to the Wiltshire Police. If serious crime is experienced the 999 should be dialled, and for all other reports including: illegal off-roading, illegal motor biking, drone use, poaching, hare coursing, petty theft, camping on MoD land, kite flying, please call 101 and list the call as 'antisocial behaviour' and a Byelaw violation.

Once reported please inform Range control on the Plainwatch number: 01980 67 4700 or PLAINWATCH@landmarc.mod.uk. The more information received the better, e.g. time, place, vehicle registration, description of individuals and vehicles.


