IMBERBUS DAY


Saturday 17th August

The Village Hall Trustees are getting ready for some hard work but it's worth it in the end as it's one of our biggest earners.

This is the day when up to 25 old and new London Transport Routemaster buses will be the only vehicles allowed to travel to Imber village and on to other parts of Salisbury Plain. The buses start outside Warminster Rail Station but can also be picked up in Chitterne, outside the Village Hall. If you've never done it, it is certainly a great day out and when you return, you can pop into the hall and have a well earned tea and cake.

Tickets are £10 for adults & £2 for children. These allow you unlimited travel on all the buses. Please note that no concessionary bus passes can be used on the day.

CHITTERNE WAR MEMORIAL 'BEFORE'



Whilst our collective attention has been drawn to commemorating those lost during the Normandy operation and World War 2, work has now been completed to restore our War Memorial to 'the fallen and servicemen who had served in the First World War' back to its original splendour. The work was expertly done by Steve Davies, Military Grave Restorer on Thursday 27th June 2024.

But do you know how it was funded, who made it, how much it cost and who unveiled it?

The Chitterne 'Now & Then' website records that the Village held a sale in aid of the 'Peace Celebration Fund' on 3rd of May 1919. A total of £111 4s 4d was raised. There is no official mention of how the money was used, but it would seem a logical deduction that on 27th May 1920, the Chitterne War Memorial Committee (CWMC) commissioned E Strong, Marble & Monumental Sculptor, Warminster to construct the memorial with these funds. Their receipt, dated August 1920 for £114 7s 6d was paid on 4th September 1920 by the CWMC and is on the website. 'Then & Now' also reveals that Field Marshal Viscount Allenby unveiled the War Memorial on Sunday 28th August 1920. Why him? Edmund Allenby's sister Faith,

lived at Chitterne House with her husband Vice-Admiral Charles Lionel Napier.
